


Website for CAFS

Say Soy! Keshun Liu

About 4000 to 5000 years ago, our ancestors discovered the soybean and started to cultivate it. Since then our ancestors have found many ways to prepare food from the bean, including tofu, soymilk, yuba, soy sauce, jiang, and douchi, etc. Several thousands of years later, as we enter into the new millennium, to our ancestors' delight, this ancient bean has turned into a miracle bean, and foods made with soy are finally prized for their functional health benefits by people in the West and around the world.

It all started with medical research initiated a decade ago. Since then, numerous medical studies have shown that soy plays an important role in preventing and treating many chronic diseases, including heart diseases, bone diseases, cancers, etc. It also plays an important role in women's health. As a result, last October, FDA issued a ruling to allow products with at least 6.25 g of soy protein to carry a health claim that soy protein, combined with a diet low in saturated fat and dietary cholesterol, may reduce the risk of coronary heat disease.

The FDA decision has thus set off a rush by mainstream food companies to embrace the bean. Even before the ruling, there has been an increased activity in product development with soy. For example, in 1999, when overall new product introductions appeared to be on the decline in the U.S., the number of new soyfoods introduced into the market almost doubled from the previous year (about 170 for 1998). Sale of soyfoods has also increased at a faster rate (somewhere between 15-30%).

In line with this exciting development, a few members from CAFS have helped organize a symposium entitled "Product Development with Soy" for the coming IFT Annual Meeting, with CAFS being as a co-sponsor. Other co-sponsors include IFT Product Development Division and IFT International Division.

The symposium (Session 83) is scheduled on Wed. June 14, AM. Every CAFS member is encouraged to participate. Here is the program outline for your information.
