

The 7th World Congress of Food Science and Technology held in Singapore (9/28-10/2/87) was very interesting and memorable to me. More than 1000 delegates from about 50 countries attended the conference. Several hundred papers were presented in the technical sessions. There were also exhibits and poster papers, but those did not attract much attention.

The interesting part to me was to have the opportunity to see and meet food technologists from all over of the world. A lot of them from Australia, Tailand, Philippines, Japan, etc. About 100 people from the USA, including many of our members (Kun-Yu Chang, Yao-Wen Huang, Y. C. Jao, Joseph Jen, John Lu, Nancy Lu, B. S. Luh, James Moy and Robert Ma, etc.). Taiwan, ROC had a delegation of 30+ persons (including CAFS members: Taylor Chang and Andi Oh Chen) and mainland China send a team of 8 people. Of course, many other delegates from other parts of South-east Asia, such as Singapore, Malaysia, Tailand, Philippins, Indonesia, Hong Kong, and Brunei, are of Chinese descent, and we almost held a sub-meeting in Mandarin. The opening ceremony of the Congress—the big and loud dragon dance was very impressive.

Singapore is a pretty, clean and modern city. I enjoyed my visit to Singapore and the World Congress.

The next Congress will be in Toronto, Canada, 1991. Plan now to attend. Save your time and money for this event. It will be fun.

What's the Right Tip?

A Guide to the Gratuity Game

For many business travelers, nothing is more baffling than the ancient practice of tipping.

If you don't tip enough, you may feel the cold stare of a waiter – right in front of several business colleagues. Or, if you've over tipped, you can feel a bit foolish. In any case, it's wise to remember that service people earn their living from tips.

taxis worldwide. But in some countries – for example, Japan – there's no tipping.

Limos. The taxi rule applies. But watch out if your company or host is supplying the car. The free ride might include the tip. Ask the driver. You might, however, want to give the driver \$3-\$5, especially if it's a long ride.

Bellmen. Give bellmen 75 cents per bag in a com-

eral consensus: It's nice to leave some dollars behind. About \$2-\$3 a day is sufficient.

Again, in European and Far East hotels, watch out. Chambermaid fees go right on your bill as part of an all-inclusive service charge.

Concierge. If you're staying a few days, tip the concierge \$5-\$10 for a few inquiries and restaurant recommendations. (There is no fee for concierge services.) Give a little extra for repeated assistance. It's not a bad idea to tip in advance if you expect to use the concierge frequently.

U.S. Restaurants. In restaurants in major cities, from New York to Los Angeles, tip 15%. Give the headwaiter \$3-\$5 for getting you a good table at a crowded time. And tip the wine steward \$2-\$3 for routine advice; \$5 if he or she unobtrusively keeps your glass full.

Foreign Restaurants. Most restaurants abroad take the mystery out of tipping and simply levy a 15% service charge. If you're not sure, look at the bottom of the menu or ask the headwaiter.

When in doubt about any aspect of tipping, your hotel concierge is your best guide.

Despite widespread uneasiness about it, most of the time tipping is remarkably routine. The amount may vary according to the city, the country and the quality of service. But there's no secret as to what's appropriate. Here are some guidelines.

Airports. Give \$1 to curbside skycaps who glance at your ticket and check your bags. It helps ensure that your luggage will get on the right plane.

Taxis. Tipping between 10% and 15% works just fine for most

mercial hotel, \$1 in a deluxe establishment.

Room Service. Hotels generally charge \$1 or \$2 for any kind of room service, so a tip is optional. You don't need to tip if breakfast comes with your room. But if you choose extras beyond, say, a Continental breakfast, you should tip 10%-15%. Overseas, luxury and first-class hotels put the tip (service charge) right on your bill. So don't double-tip.

Chambermaids. No one, not even a top hotel executive, can tell you exactly what to tip chambermaids. The root problem is you often can't find the person who tidied your room. The gen-

Book Review

Title: The Genius of China

Author: Robert Temple

Through endless enthusiasms and efforts of Dr. Joseph Needham for more than 45 years, 15 out of planned 25 volumes of "Science and Civilisations in China" have been published. These volumes unfold 3000 years of undisputed masters of invention and discovery. The ancient Chinese were the first to chart the heavens, discover the circulation of the blood, and even isolate sex hormones. From the suspension bridge and the seismography to the blast furnace, iron plow, parachute, and fishing reel, ancient China's contributions in engineering, medicine, technology, math, science, warfare, transportation, and music helped inspire the European agricultural and industrial revolutions. However, these volumes are very expensive, even many libraries cannot afford them.

In 1984, Robert Temple approched Joseph Needham expressing his intention of writing a popular book for the general reader based upon Dr. Needham's half-century cumulated work. The permission was enthusiastically and readily granted. "The Genius of China" was then published in 1986. This book is a brilliant distillation of the 15 published volumes of "Science and Civilisation in China". It has also been supplemented with numerous topics (deep drilling, porcelain, stirrups and crossbows, guns and gunpowder, etc.) drawn upon typescripts, proofs, and oral and written accounts of yet undrafted portions of future volumes. It is believed that possibly more than half of the basic inventions and discoveries upon which the "modern world" rests come from China.

In this handsomely designed, lavishly illustrated book, Robert Temple captures the spirit and excitement of centuries of ingenuity and development into 254 pages and 11 parts for easy browsing and accurate reference:

- Agriculture
- Engineering
- Medicine and Health
- Magnetism
- Transportation and Exploration
- Warfare

- Astronomy and Cartography
- Domestic and Industrial
 - Technology
- Mathematics
- The Physical Sciences
- Sound and Music

Readers, especially of Chinese heritage, definitely will find this book very informative and of great interest. It bridges the mental chasm between East and West, and provides opportunities to have a clearer understanding of each other. You may have to buy more than one copy to avoid fighting among family members in deciding who is going to read first!
